Section F: Long Answer Questions

1. Political, economic, cultural impacts - Foreign governance replaced traditional systems; economies exploited for raw materials; suppression of local culture; promotion of Western education; long-term inequalities after decolonisation.

2. Approaches of Portuguese, Dutch, French – Portuguese interfered in religion; Dutch focused on trade with little religious interference; French mainly traded but sometimes acted against local religion (e.g., temple destruction).

3. British East India Company strategies - Divide and rule, alliances with rival states, Battle of Plassey conspiracy, Doctrine of Lapse, subsidiary alliance system.
