12. Taking Charge of Waste



Q1. What are the children and the teacher doing in the picture?

Ans. The children and the teacher are cleaning the park. They are picking up waste and keeping the surroundings neat and tidy.

Q2. Why are they cleaning the park?

Ans. They are cleaning the park to make it clean and beautiful.

They want to keep their environment healthy and free from waste.

Q3. Have you ever seen piles of waste lying around your home or school?

Ans. Yes, sometimes I have seen piles of waste lying near dustbins, roads, or school corners.

Q4. Have you ever thought about how this waste is created?

Ans. Yes, this waste is created when we throw away things like food wrappers, paper, bottles, fruit peels, and plastic bags after using them.



Q. Recall different activities that you and your elders do during the day. How do these activities create waste? Finally, what do we do with the waste?

Ans. During the day, we do many activities that create waste.

- When we cook food, we get vegetable peels and leftover food.
- When we study or write, we get waste paper and pencil shavings.
- When we buy things, we get plastic wrappers and packets.
- When we clean the house, we collect dust and old or broken things.

All these things become waste.

We put this waste into dustbins so that it can be collected and managed properly.

How is waste created?

Q1. How do you feel about it?

Ans. I feel sad and unhappy when I see piles of waste lying around. It makes our surroundings dirty and unhealthy.

Q2. Do you think we can do something about it?

Ans. Yes, we can keep our surroundings clean by throwing waste in dustbins, reducing the use of plastic, and helping in cleanliness drives.



Q1. How clean are the surroundings of your school?

Ans. The surroundings of my school are very clean. The classrooms, corridors, and playground are swept every day. Dustbins are kept in every corner to collect waste.

Q2. Do you find waste lying in or outside your classrooms or on the school grounds?

Ans. Sometimes I see paper bits or wrappers on the ground, but we pick them up and throw them into the dustbin to keep our school neat and tidy.

Ans.

At School: I sometimes see bits of paper, wrappers, and pencil shavings on the classroom floor or around the school grounds. Dustbins are placed in the school, but some students forget to use them properly. We remind each other to keep the school clean.

At Home: Most of the waste at home comes from the kitchen, such as vegetable peels, food wrappers, and old newspapers. We keep our home clean by putting waste in separate bins for wet and dry waste.

Outside: When I look around outside, I often see plastic bags, bottles, and wrappers lying on the streets or near parks. Some people throw waste carelessly, but I try to throw waste only in the dustbin and keep the surroundings clean.

1. Imagine you are having a birthday party at your home. What are some of the ways in which you can try to have a zero-waste birthday party?

Ans. At a birthday party, waste like plastic plates, cups, wrappers, and leftover food is usually created.

To have a zero-waste birthday party, I can:

- Use steel or paper plates and cups instead of plastic ones.
- Decorate with paper streamers and flowers instead of plastic balloons.
- Serve homemade food and snacks instead of packed items.
- Give return gifts made from reused or eco-friendly materials.
- Collect all waste and throw it in proper dustbins after the party.
- 2. Have you seen waste in nature? What do you think happens to the waste of animals, dried leaves and so on in a forest?

Ans. Yes, I have seen waste like dried leaves and animal droppings in nature. In forests, this waste rots and mixes with the soil, turning into natural manure (compost) that helps new plants grow.

Nothing in nature is wasted — it all becomes a part of the soil again.
